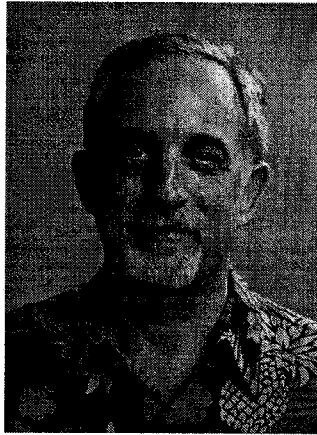


## MITCH KAPOR



Mitchell Kapor is the founder of Lotus Development Corporation and the designer of Lotus 1-2-3, the “killer application” which made the personal computer ubiquitous in the business world of the 1980s.

Mr. Kapor has been an entrepreneur and startup investor for 25 years. Through Kapor Capital, he invests actively in the next generation of significant information technology startups and social ventures in the San Francisco Bay Area.

He is currently a board member of the Mitchell Kapor Foundation, a private foundation works to ensure fairness and equity particularly for low-income communities of color; and the Level Playing Field Institute, whose mission is to enhance equal opportunity in education and the workplace.

He serves on the advisory boards of Generation Investment Management (sustainable long-term investing), the Electronic Frontier Foundation (defending free speech, privacy, innovation, and consumer rights on the Internet), the Sunlight Foundation (improving access to government information), and the Wikimedia Foundation (producer of Wikipedia and other free content projects).

He is the Founding Chair and a Director of Linden Lab, the creator of the virtual world Second Life, and he was the Founding Chair of the Mozilla Foundation, creator of the Firefox web browser.

Mr. Kapor has written widely about the impact of personal computing and networks on society. He has contributed articles, columns, and op-ed pieces on information infrastructure policy, intellectual property issues, and antitrust in the digital era to *Scientific American*, *The New York Times*, *Forbes*, the *Communications of the ACM*, and *Huffington Post*.

Mr. Kapor received a B.A. from Yale College in 1971 and studied psychology, linguistics, and computer science as part of an interdisciplinary major.
